

Welcome to the 2024 catalog of TRUE LEAP PRES

ire to the prisons. Burn down the amerikkkan plantation. True Leap is a mostly informal publishing collective originally based in the Midwest, and currently hosts a P.O. Box in the East Bay. We operate an inside-outside "Zine Distro" that creates, prints, and circulates zines specifically for imprisoned people and autonomous groups fighting against the prison regime. The materials in our catalog have been curated by revolutionary abolitionists who are engaged in resistance from within U.S. gulags and use the materials to organize study groups in facilities across multiple states. Heavy input has also been provided by friends with extensive experience in "outside" support roles. Existing since 2016, we have been part of a growing autonomous network of prison abolitionists challenging bans on antiracist, decolonial, and queer education materials and the censorship of liberatory information by the police state. We're not a charity group or a university-based study program. When making requests of the collective, please respect that this work runs on donated labor and a shoestring budget. The following update provides some reflection on the past year, with news on what to expect from us moving forward and instructions on how to make requests from the catalog or find the support you need. Please read carefully?



A bit of what we do...

Our printing and distribution network primarily serves imprisoned people, mailing zines by request into prisons and jails at no charge for the reader. Much of this literature is original; much of it is relevant formats for the prison struggle; some of it is a curated selection of texts that are inaccessible inside yet popularly circulating on the "outs." The literature available can be used for anything, but is primary used for study on topics ranging from Black Studies, Native Studies, anarchist theory, abolitionist practices, histories of anti-prison and anti-police insurgency, anti-fascism, Black autonomy, queer and trans liberation, decolonization, disability justice, law library/legal guides, prisoner resistance, organizer toolkits, skillshares, and other catalogs from distro's and books to prison crews.



Updates & Reflections

Last year we printed and distributed thousands of zines, primarily to people imprisoned in over 30 states. We also had an upsurge in bulk orders for collective projects in the community. Unfortunately, with the proliferation of mail digitization services, "non-book" paper mail restrictions, and new methods of censoring books and zines alike, this work of supplying reading materials inside has become more time-consuming and arduous than ever. More than any other year, our materials were unable to make it in to readers, and we are sometimes sending zines in three times following different procedures without any luck getting materials in.

We need word to spread that our zine distro is *always* active; even if we take momentary pauses to regather. So when communication is cut off, we need people to not take it personal and to reach out. We are not a legal support group.

We are here to support through sending literature inside, while other groups exist to provide defense for you when you take collective action. We will, however, help publicize the actions you take, especially if it is a *collective* action. We will also help spread word about your formation, encourage people to build in small groups, and to take direct action instead of relying on representatives and the State to make changes. We understand our insideoutside collective to be only a small (informal) group of people, whom exist amongst numerous collectives and individuals creating avenues of solidarity. That is, we are operating within an ecosystem of decentralized resistance and counter-information networks.



This past year, we hit an impossible limit with our existing resources, in terms of the scale of distribution and the pace. Some of the zines in past catalogs, we have no more copies of, including the originals. From these lesson we've adapted, and now have a new catalog, with zine titles and once again a list of topics and themes for you to also request from if you are unsure of what titles to select. We also have included a variety of new literature, and some zines in previous catalogs we have taken out of circulation because, our politics have changed and diverged.

Out of every year we've ever done this project, this was the most frustrating year of rejections. We've received word that people aren't even being notified of zines reaching a prison. We might pursue some sort of Freedom of Information Act processes, because some of our readers are claiming that they are not receiving zines, when we have in fact (with documentation) mailed stuff with the proper specifications, postage, address. As in, word doesn't even reach them from the mailroom. This is a practice — called "non-distribution" — that some PA DOC prisons perfected before we put them on blast with a phone zap in 2019.

Against Censorship. 凸(`o')凸


he Campaign Against Prison Censorship and Book Banning is in early stages of formation. There are many groups already resisting, involved in their own locally situated struggles. There are so many of our fam inside who are involved in their own individual and collective resistance to bans on reading materials and the censorship of our communications and information flow into prisons and jails. There has been several different convergences of people and new collectivities also forming. Such encounters range from small meetings and community forums to larger public events and shared writing in publications. The basic idea we are promoting is to connect these different struggles together into a stronger constellation of autonomous abolitionist insurgency. For us, "autonomous" means independent of the interests of the State, capital, and industries that are built on extraction from liberatory social movements and the capture of actually-existing abolitionist insurgency.



Copies of the zine have been printed and distributed to imprisoned people across several states, the first zine was accompanied with a survey. Since January, abolitionist prisoner solidarity crews have been printing and distributing issue #1 of this series to people locked up, accompanied with a survey.



Campaign Against Prison Censorship and Book Banning



Survey Fragments

From Xinachtli (Texas DOC captive):

"Despite a federal court 'legal victory' on our 1st amendment rights (Guajardo v Estelle) — 'free-speech' does not exist specifically if one is 'classified' as 'leftist' or 'abolitionist'.... Many of my writings have been confiscated under racist oppressive rules. Revolutionary abolitionist materials that will awaken the minds of prisoners r constantly banned, for the prison knows that once prisoners become 'class conscious' they have the potential for revolution

From Greg Curry (Ohio DOC captive):

I get mostly 'anarchist' books & 2 out of every 4 is banned/denied. Cops feel a certain kind of way on certain subjects so when they see books to the contrary in my cell, they at times act hostile. Including the persons screening books... Materials get censored because of personal bias, so a racist will hate anything Black that come in. And since banning is just based off their opinion of a sentence they can hide their bias.

From LB:

The copying of our mail was meant 2 move correspondence between prisoners & family members to the GTL service 4 more profits & surveillance. They restrict even photos! Photos arnt a 'security risk'. What the facility allows is a "risk" of psychological oppression.

From SKS Heruglyphx (Florida DOC captive):

I've had books lost by overseers & many rejected (blocked) publications namely: Nile Valley Contribution to Civilization, Socialist Viewpoint, The Abolitionist newspaper by Critical Resistance, & this is both ongoing and pre-existing...

...They gave me possession of gang paraphernalia for having the BPP Ten Point Platform and quote from Stokely Carmichael. 30 days in confinement at Okeechobee C.I. in November 2015.

Most of my books come from AK Press. One of my comrades, Karen Smith, Rest in Power, had gotten me an <u>@AKPressDistro</u> membership. The best gift i've ever had. I guess to was her way of nurturing my revolutionary aspirations and potential....

...I receive zines frm True Leap Press & @beilyzine. They keep me updated & fully equipped in educating fellow prisoners. Since scanning brothers arent receiving the zines. They're receiving rejections frm the authoritarian goons. Brothers r thirsty fr the class consciousness.

From Sharky:

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Reading changed my life. Being able 2 find answers 2 questions outside of 'it's all your fault and nothing nor anyone's fault but urs, repent & pray 2 god!' It's liberating. When done in community it transforms ur way of thinking & being w/ others.

...My kites goin out 2 Orgs & loved 1's oftn disappear, same usually w/kites tht talk ab/t organizing, pig harassment, administrative tactics...My art & books get criminalized as 'gang related' & gets confiscated or thrown away. They even take photos of it & save in a file

I file grievances 4 all the bullshit but the injustices continue. They get off my back 4 a little but they continue their bullshit on someone else. When i succeed they just change the reasons from 'gang related' 2 'poster size' or 'inciting violence' 2 'publisher/vendor'

From Kenneth Simpson (IDOC captive):

All confiscation forms don't actually name each item being confiscated... well mine never did. So i can't say for certain which ones. I know i requested zines about COINTELPRO, Frantz Fanon, and the BPP to name few I didn't receive....

One of the occasions when my zines were confiscated i began to question why and was told they 'don't have to explain' to me what they consider concerning or not safe. I could either have the material mailed out or destroyed.

From my perspective the punishment was not being able to receive the literature.

From Michael Deweese (IDOC captive):

I have had <u>@sfbayview</u> confiscated before due to 'Security Threat Group' (STG) reasons... It was because the paper had the words 'Black Panther' in one of the articles

From Gary Lamont Bunn Jr. (Pelican Bay State Prison captive):

The books that've been blocked are George Jackson books because the I.S.U. said they are 'Black Guerrilla Family' based material.

Once the prison officials start cutting back with no push back from the public or prisoners they will continue to take more little by little from the prisoners.



From Thadieus Goods (Cook County Jail):

They want total control over what u do, who u communicate w/. Supporters use to hold noise demos in front of the jail & the administration didn't like that. They would always send my stuff back as a form of retaliation & punishment...

I once was attacked by an inmate at the directive of a CO because I be the voice against the corrupt administration. They scan and copy certain people mail like mine because i'm against administration and I let be known. FTP

From Alfonso Percy Pew (PADOC captive):

You must know books in general are not the only banned thing, The PA DOC suppresses literature, letters, information. The PA DOC purpose is to sabotage communications. There needs to be attention paid to all of the mail....

The for profit entity Smart Communications Inc. (St Petersburg Florida). The owners are James Logan and Jon Logan. What I want

you to do is condemn the PA DOC contract with Smart Communications Inc. James Logan and Jon Logan!

In Pennsylvania, we can't get mail or cards only photo copies. I have enclosed #3 it is a holiday card envelope. I want y'all out there to see it and really feel it. Just imagine a child sending a Christmas card or new years card to a parent?

From Sean Swain (OSP Youngstown)

This isn't just about prisons. This's about the consolidation of power—FBI, etc.—streamlining a centralized uniform system of control & surveillance w/ complicity by federal courts. A universal disempowerment program employed on PRISONERS first.

From Kaono (PA-DOC capitve):

If we don't continue to fight censorship, book bans, & mail digitization, we're gonna lose many writers & artists that could be the spark that changes the world....

Being shotdown over& over is crazy disheartening. I know frm experience. Its a tactic used by pigs 2 break us down & take the fight from us. We need u our comrades in the world 2 continue 2 fight along side of us. It's ya'll who help strengthen our resolve & continue 2 fight.

Chicago Books to Women in Prison



The only jail they mail to is Cook County Jail.
